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- Community health workers (CHWs) have long played an essential role in public health response and mitigating health disparities
- The COVID-19 pandemic shone a spotlight on CHWs and their critical role within communities and the health care system
- In March 2021, Congress enacted The American Rescue Plan Act, which allocated funding for the recruitment, hiring, and training of CHWs—recognizing CHWs as an essential part of the health care workforce





- 17 states currently reimburse CHWs through their Medicaid programs
- Many CHW programs are financed using braided fundsa combination of philanthropic grants, public grants, and more traditional fee-for-service models
- Grants are usually timelimited, have limited scope, and are not designed with communities or CHWs as a part of the planning process





 Families USA has been hosting a series of listening sessions to hear directly from CHWs and other relevant stakeholders about challenges and successes with supporting and scaling up the workforce
